Spend six weeks undertaking a creative arts / design practicum in Indonesia

The Creative Arts and Design Professional Practicum (CADPP) will expose Australian students to the vibrancy of contemporary Indonesian arts and cultural production, combining academic elements with hands-on practical creative production experience.

The academic components of the program (language classes and industry seminar series) will be hosted by an ACICIS Indonesian partner university. The practicum placement will involve Australian students collaborating with Indonesian peers and creative practitioners to produce work including, but not limited to: short films, animations, sound and video art, websites, online installations, blogs and social media apps.

The program runs from early January to mid-February each year.

What is involved?

- ◆ 2 weeks of intensive Indonesian language classes (morning);
- ◆ 2 weeks of English language lectures (afternoon) by experts on the Indonesian creative economy; and
- ◆ A 4-week supervised practicum to give students an English-speaking 'professional experience' in international creative arts and design.

What will you get out of it?

- ◆ Experience in creative arts and design in a professional context and a chance to establish networks in Indonesia;
- ◆ A detailed professional evaluation (suitable for your CV/job reference);
- ◆ Academic credit towards your university degree.
