# Undertake a six week internship with a community development organisation in Indonesia

Study in Indonesia and **gain credit** towards your degree

This six-week innovative 'hands-on' summer program in Indonesia's capital, Jakarta is designed for students of development studies. This practicum allows participants to gain valuable experience working in the field of international development.

Students will be given the unique opportunity to learn about development issues in a country that, with tens of millions of disadvantaged people and large endowments of natural resources, is central to global efforts to reduce poverty and promote sustainable development. Exposure to the Indonesian language and culture enriches the overall experience.

## What is involved?

- ◆ 2 weeks of intensive Indonesian language classes (morning);
- ◆ 2 weeks of English language lectures (afternoon) by experts on Indonesian development issues; and
- ◆ A 4-week supervised internship to give students an English-speaking 'headquarters experience', with local and international NGOs.

The internship enables students to engage with community development issues in Indonesia while also gaining important practical skills related to advocacy, administration, program coordination, fund-raising and policy-making for development.
