Undertake 3-6 weeks of intensive Indonesian language training in Indonesia for academic credit towards your Australian or home university degree.

About the program

The ACICIS Indonesian Language Short Course (ILSC) provides intensive language training to students from beginners to advanced levels in Indonesian language.

Running in both Australian and northern hemisphere university summer and winter vacation periods, a student may undertake the program to fast-track or supplement language studies at their home university, or as a standalone introduction to the Indonesian language for those students exploring a nascent interest in Indonesia.

The program may also be undertaken as a preparatory or capstone language program for students undertaking ACICIS' six-week practicum and semester programs.

What is involved?

- ◆ 3 or 6 weeks of intensive classroom-based Indonesian language training at an ACICIS Indonesian partner university (TBC);
- ◆ A series of Indonesian cultural familiarisation seminars; as well as
- ◆ Excursions and fieldtrips.
